



32 NATIONAL PARKS


The Bahamas' national park system comprises 2.2 million acres of national parks and protected areas, making it the largest protected area network in the region.

ATTRACTIONS BYREGON



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JEWELS OF THE NORTH

With nine national parks, including six in The Abacos alone, the Northern Bahamas is a nature lover's paradise. Across these island gems, discover habitats protecting the endangered coral reefs, seabird nesting sites, and mangrove forests.

PELICAN CAYS LAND & SEA PARK

Marsh Harbour

Featuring daytime/snorkel moorings, this vast no-take reserve features extensive undersea caves and coral reefs, as well as pristine beaches for swimming and sunbathing.



WALKER'S CAY NATIONAL PARK

Walker's Cay

A favourite of divers, Walker's Cay is fringed by its own barrier reef and features stunning coral and underwater cathedrals teeming with tropical fish, turtles and eagle rays.



ABACO NATIONAL PARK

South Abaco

A birdwatching hotspot, Abaco National Park was created to protect the Bahama Parrot, which nests in underground cavities beneath the park's vast Caribbean Pine forest.

BIMINI



BIMINI SHARK LAB

South Bimini

Operated by the Bimini Biological Field Station Foundation, the Bimini Shark Lab is dedicated to the study and understanding of marine animal biology.



HEALING HOLE

East Bimini

Accessible by kayak, this freshwater pond in the middle of a saltwater mangrove swamp is said to have healing properties.



BIMINI ROAD

North Bimini

Said to be the ancient underwater road leading to the lost city of Atlantis, this unique dive site features mysterious rock formations.

FREEPORT



LUCAYAN NATIONAL PARK

Grand Bahama Highway

This popular 40-acre park features boardwalks and trails winding through all six of The Bahamas' ecosystems, as well as one of the world's longest charted underwater cave systems.



PETERSON CAY NATIONAL PARK

Off Freeport's Southern Shore

A mile offshore, this aeolian limestone cay, the smallest national park in The Bahamas, is a favourite for birdwatching and snorkeling and diving alongside manta rays and barracuda.



RAND NATURE CENTRE

A popular attraction, this 100-acre sanctuary near downtown Freeport features boardwalks and trails winding through coppice, pine forest, and nearly 130 identified plants.







THE BOILING HOLE

Explored by Jacques Cousteau, this bubbling whirlpool is the starting point to an underwater cave system edged by mangroves.


FERN GULLY

Filled with a rare species of ferns known as leather-back, Fern Gully is a large fertile sinkhole near the entrance to Josey Cave, a unique cavern formed from fossilized reefs.

GARDEN OF THE GROVES

Exotic plants and flowers, waterfalls, migratory birds and butterflies, and a spiritual labyrinth are highlights of this tranquil attraction.







A dozen national parks dot the islands of the Central Bahamas, including the world's first land and sea park. Surprises await, too, including lush pineapple fields and some very photogenic swimming pigs.

BEST KNOWN FOR

Blue holes, pineapple fields, swimming pigs, and pink sand beaches

ANDROS



JOULTER CAYS NATIONAL PARK

North Andros

This famous geological site is a hub for researchers studying Andros' oolitic sand formations and sand flats, as well as a winter habitat for migratory shore birds including the critically endangered Piping Plovers.



THE TONGUE OF THE OCEAN

Between Andros and New Providence

Featuring beautiful coral formations and sponges, this immensely deep submarine canyon is known as one of the top wall diving sites in the world.



BLUE HOLES NATIONAL PARK

North Andros

This 40,000-acre park protects 22 unique inland blue holes, and the surrounding rich coppice and pineland forests are home to a variety of wildlife.





North Andros

Also known as Little Frenchman Blue Hole, this 417-foot deep freshwater blue hole surrounded by pine forest is among the island's most notable.



RAINBOW BLUE HOLE TRAIL

Central Andros

A winding trail through coppice, coastal pine forest, bromeliads and rare orchids brings you to the Rainbow Blue Hole, a fresh water swimming hole.



WEST SIDE NATIONAL PARK

West Side of Andros

As one of the largest Marine Protected Areas in the Western Atlantic, this park is comprised 1.5 million acres of pineland, dense mangroves and a variety of flats of pristine blue water.

ELEUTHERA & HARBOUR ISLAND



GLASS WINDOW BRIDGE

Eleuthera

Just 30 feet wide, this strip of rock separates the rich blue waters of the Atlantic Ocean from the Bight of Eleuthera's calm turquoise waters.



LEON LEVY NATIVE PLANT PRESERVE

Governor's Harbour, Eleuthera

A research and education centre, this 30-acre preserve focuses on traditional bush medicine, indigenous plant propagation, and the biodiversity of The Bahamas.



OCEAN HOLE

South Eleuthera

Located on the southern edge of Rock South, this seemingly bottomless saltwater inland blue hole is believed to have healing powers.





These natural pools are filled with waves, shells and small sea life that wash over from the Atlantic, creating clear, warmed-by-the-sun tidal pools perfect for soaking.

HATCHET BAY CAVE

North Eleuthera

Filled with stalagmites and stalactites that resemble torch-lit underground cathedrals, Hatchet Bay Cave is the island's most extensive, measuring a mile long and 1,100 feet underground.



PINK SAND BEACH

Harbour Island

A composite of coral, broken shells, tiny rocks and calcium carbonate gives this famous three-mile stretch of sand on the Atlantic its naturally rosy hue.

THE SWIMMING PIGS

Big Major Cay

Accessible by boat from Great Exuma or Nassau, Big Major Cay (aka Pig Island) is the uninhabited island home of our friendly (and world-famous) swimming pigs.



EXUMA CAYS LAND & SEA PARK

Exuma Cays

The world's first land and sea park as well as the Bahamas' oldest national park, this protected ecosanctuary spans more than 100,000 acres of beaches, blue holes, coral reefs, islands and ocean.




THUNDERBALL GROTTO

Featuring a small, nearly hidden entrance, this incredible underwater cave system teems with exotic marine life and brilliantly coloured coral reefs.

NASSAU & PARADISE ISLAND





Nassau

Spanning 156 acres, this popular park features hiking trails, historic sites, sandy beaches and offshore coral reefs. Don't miss Ocean Atlas, the world's largest underwater sculpture just offshore.

A must-see for kids, this attraction located minutes from downtown Nassau features marching flamingos, parrots, and peacocks amid its lush tropical gardens. mile long and 1,100 feet underground.




THE RETREAT GARDEN

Nassau

The Retreat Garden is an 11-acre urban oasis in the heart of the capital city. A haven for birds, it features a world-renowned garden of palms and rare tropical plants.

BEST KNOWN FOR

HOPE GREAT HOUSE

Crooked Island

Encompassing nearly four acres, this national park protects the ancient remains of early 19th century Loyalist plantations.



MARINE FARM

Crooked Island

A one-time Loyalist compound with well-preserved remains of the artillery battery and living quarters, Marine Farm is a national park set on more than four acres.

INAGUA



INAGUA NATIONAL PARK

Great Iguana

Home to the world's largest breeding colony of West Indian flamingos, this 287-square-mile park is on the Ramsar list of Wetlands of International Importance.



LITTLE INAGUA **NATIONAL PARK**

Little Inagua

Spanning 62,800 acres, this protected park comprises the largest uninhabited island in the wider Caribbean and is a nesting location for critically endangered sea turtles.



UNION CREEK RESERVE

Great Inagua

A well-known sea turtle research centre, this reserve is a natural habitat for Green and Hawksbill turtles, as well as mangroves and lush seagrass beds.

LONG ISLAND



DEAN'S BLUE HOLE

Off Queen's Highway

The Bahamas' second deepest blue hole and the second largest underwater chamber in the world, this saltwater swimming hole is 663 feet deep.



HAMILTON'S CAVE

Off Queen's Highway

Open for guided tours, this ancient cave system is the largest in The Bahamas. Highlights include 50foot passages and 10-foot ceilings.

SAN SALVADOR



GREEN'S BAY NATIONAL PARK

Rare San Salvador rock iguanas are protected within this tranquil park, which also features a healthy reef system and a stretch of rocky shoreline that supports shearwaters and tropicbirds.



WEST COAST MARINE PARK

Cockburn Town

Popular with divers, this national park protects some of the Bahamas' most dramatic coral wall formations, as well as seabird nesting habitats and the anchorage location for Christopher Columbus' first landfall in the Bahamas.



SOUTHERN GREAT LAKE NATIONAL PARK

San Salvador

Featuring an extensive mangrove ecosystem, this pristine park protects nesting areas for birds and is home to the endangered San Salvador rock iguana.



PERRY INSTITUTE FOR MARINE SCIENCE (PIMS)

PIMS has partnered with a number of local conservation organizations, research labs, dive operators and other stakeholders to create the Bahamas Coral Reef Restoration network (BRRN). The goal of the BRRN is to assist with reversing the decline of coral reefs throughout The Bahamas by providing support to local communities to sustain biodiversity, improve habitat for key fishery species, enhance value for tourism and provide other ecosystem services. Through this project, PIMS is able to provide training, assist with site selection based on recent research and monitoring and provide other technical support for growing corals in nurseries and out-planting those corals to reefs.
